I'll never know how much it cost to see my sin upon that cross I'll never know how much it cost to see my sin upon that cross We are looking today at the Gospel of Matthew Ch14 v22-33 – **Jesus walks on water**. This passage has many messages to us today and the more I read it and study information about and around this miracle, the more I learn which is good; no, very good!!

Reading - Matthew 14 v 22-33 (ENGLISH STANDARD VERSION)

Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go before him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but the boat by this time was a long way from land, beaten by the waves, for the wind was against them. And in the fourth watch of the night he came to them, walking on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, and said, "It is a ghost!" and they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them, saying, ""Take heart, it is I. Do not be afraid." And Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat and walked on the water and came to Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid, and beginning to sink he cried out, "Lord save me." Jesus immediately reached out his hand and took hold of him, saying to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" And when they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

Reflection

Introduction

This account in Matthew is very familiar to me and maybe to most of us but it raises many questions – one being:

'Why did Jesus leave the disciples for nine hours battling against a fearsome storm in a small boat alone?'

I know from experience what being on open and extremely rough sea in a small boat is like. Going over to St Kilda, an archipelago, 40 miles west of the Isle of Lewis, in the Outer Hebrides in the North Atlantic Ocean, we went on an ex-fishing boat, quite small but not as small as the disciples' boat and we had the advantage of an engine. It took us about 9 hours and it was exciting but frightening at the same time. The disciples must have been frightened and exhausted especially the ones who weren't fishermen by trade.

This following reflection goes a long way to answering my question:

Peter drops everything to follow Jesus which is exciting; it is exciting to follow Jesus isn't it? Until one day you realise you can't see Him at all. So this day Jesus wanted time alone to be with his Father, to pray. So He sent the disciples off ahead of Him to cross the Sea of Galilee. The disciples probably felt a bit disappointed because Jesus called them to be with Him wherever he goes and now He is leaving them alone to cross the sea.

But in life today with all the troubles and stress, Jesus can feel a long way off at times. We can feel as if we are drifting alone, wondering where Jesus is.

The disciples were alone in their tiny boat, when a ferocious storm comes in an instant. Lots of things happen in life in an instant – people tell us lies, illness, accident, bereavement and dark thoughts which can cause us many problems – to name a few. You can feel like you are sinking especially when it seems Jesus is nowhere to be seen.

The disciples see 'something' walking on the water and are afraid crying, "Is it a ghost?" But it is Peter who stands up and shouts, "Jesus if that's you, call me to you on the water." Jesus responds, "Come." And Peter does it, he steps out of the boat onto the water, what a miracle! That is until Peter remembers the storm and takes his eyes off Jesus and looks at the waves – and that's when Peter sinks!

As long as Peter was staring at the problem rather than Jesus, the storm was going to drag him down. It's when we think our troubles are bigger than Jesus that we sink. As long as we keep our eyes on our problems instead of looking at Jesus, the storm overtakes us.

Peter cries, "Lord save me." Jesus saves Peter in a flash, when Peter realises his own hopelessness. Jesus says to him and us now, 'I am right here, I have been here all the time'. Maybe the waves and the storms are bigger than us; Jesus is our only hope and even if He feels far away, He is right there to help us. Jesus never says there won't be storms – the pain of life will smash into us before we even know it's here, in an instant, and when the problems rise and the worries of life wash over us, Jesus says, 'Look at Me, keep your eyes on Me, call out to Me'. I may feel far away, but I never am. Because in dark storms it is hard at times to follow Jesus and it is then that Jesus gives us power to walk in the storm.

So why did He leave the disciples alone in the boat battling the storm?

So that their faith in Him would grow?

To impress upon them that they must rely and keep their focus on Him, and put their trust in Him in all circumstances?

To make them realise that He truly is the Son of God? (And Jesus still waits for people to realise who He is today!)

Probably all these reasons and more! We need to keep our focus on Jesus especially during the difficult times we live in today and put our trust in Him. Psalm 145 v 18 says "The Lord is near to all who call on Him." Never forget that God provides for us and He always will, because He is there for us and will never fail because He knows, He cares, He loves, He promises and He fulfils. **Amen**

Let's pray:

I can rely too much on myself and, like Peter, lose sight of where I am going. Help me, Jesus, to keep my eyes fixed on You and to trust that You reach out to me, offering me loving help. **Amen**
