From the Manse

Before reading this, I invite you to read Psalm 137.

This is one of the most distressing psalms in the psalter, not only because of the terrible image given to us at the end of the psalm, but because we also encounter a nation displaced from their own land, freedom, and way of life. They sit at a river, as the water gushes by them their tears join the current and yet unlike their tears they remain in the same place, with their grief which seemingly doesn't leave them, causing the psalmist to cry in pain 'How could we sing the LORD's song in a foreign land?

There is no way of getting away from the situation, they cannot go back, because what they had has been destroyed and no longer exists. The feeling of powerlessness only adds to their distress, and yet the very next verses do not lead to this nation to accept the bleakness of their reality, but instead the psalmist insists his community do not forget Jerusalem.

Jerusalem is significant to Israel not because the land was there home, but because it was where temple dwelt. There is a whole story about the significance of the temple in what are often termed the history books of the Bible. The temple becomes for this nation rescued by God the place in which Gods presence dwells amongst them; the place where heaven and earth overlap. We find the psalmist disciplining himself to make his highest joy Jerusalem, especially since it seems that when the Israelites dwelt in the land, they often forgot all this including those who built it in the first place. It seems that the psalmist values the memory more than life itself.

The ending of the psalm should make us uncomfortable. In some ways you might feel that the verses ruin a perfectly good psalm and make it unreadable. Many are led to miss the final verses out altogether, and pretend they are not there. To do this however makes the scripture into something we want rather than allowing scripture to be what it is. This is not to justify it, but we may find in it new ways of reading, new depths of understanding, and new workings of the Spirit speaking through these ancient words.

I will offer one suggestion to approaching this difficult text, which is to recognise this psalm as written by a human being in anguish, with unbearable anger and in the presence of a just and righteous God expresses his feelings with an honesty and rawness that only God can bear. As these feelings are given to God, they are seemingly left there. Thankfully, there are no accounts in scripture of this coming to pass.

God is just; God is loving; God is able to bear our anger and grief and sorrow and take the burden and renew us. Was it ever shown more than in the death of Christ on the cross, taking the evils of this world, the pains and injustices onto himself, taking them to death and then being raised to life triumphant over it all.


As we leave this Easter season, we do not necessarily leave this strange new world that has forced itself upon us over the last months. This plan serves as an example of the impact the virus has had on all of us personally, and as a church. The fundamental aspect of meeting together has become increasingly difficult in isolation. In many ways we have found ourselves exiled in our own homes.

It is too easy for us to say we are fine and we are coping in this situation, but I want to suggest that this psalm helps us in remembering that what is happening means things are not ok. We might not be fairing well despite what we say to others, but in front of God there is no hiding. In being honest with God we also reveal the state of our souls to ourselves, which can be the most scary thing of all. But doing it with God allows us to remember that we are covered with grace, that we are held in the palm of God's hand in the midst of our weakness. Being vulnerable in front of God then becomes our greatest strength, as we allow the Holy Spirit to transform us, comfort us and bring us peace. How great is the love God has for us!

Come down, O Love divine, seek thou this soul of mine, and visit it with thine own ardour glowing O Comforter, draw near, within my heart appear, and kindle it, thy holy flame bestowing.



Pastoral Letter for the June to August Plan

What unusual and challenging times we are living through! Though we

As Stuart Townend's version of Psalm 23 says, "I will trust in you alone". We **can** trust Him – at all times and in all situations – for He is totally faithful!

May God bless you and our fellowship in Jesus Christ and may the peace of God be yours in the coming months.

The Plan for this quarter has been put together in consultation with the churches, recognising the current situation with Coronavirus. Many of our local preachers and ministers are in self-isolation or shielding at this time – please pray for everyone. We have not met as fellowships since early March, so please hold in prayer all the people in your fellowship. Hopefully, by the time you read this, a strategy will have emerged and we pray for our country and its spiritual life.

The Plan for June has been set up with the knowledge that many of our members and local preachers are in shielding or self-isolation. We may or may not be allowed to meet and we await further directions from Government and the Methodist Church. We have, however, identified possible central locations where we could safely hold services (if allowed to), meeting the restrictions for social-distancing and hand-cleansing.

We pray for those who have journeyed with God for three months – isolated in their homes – for peace, strength and God's love to fill them. Amen

The Plan for July follows further conversations with churches and indicates those who have expressed the desire to meet in their local fellowship, if and when they are able to. Each church will decide on the dates they will meet and we will produce an updated July Plan as the situation unfolds.

We pray for an outpouring of God's grace on our towns and villages, and on our fellowships as we praise and thank God 'together 'for His love. Amen

On the Plan for August we will show things as near to a normal Plan as possible, with those ministers and local preachers who are able to offer services in their "local"/ "home" church. We pray that we will be able to gather in fellowship after many months apart – but we will have to wait and see!

Lord God, for Your grace so full and free, we praise You; for our fellowship here below and the joy of heaven above, we praise You. Blessed be Your Holy name through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

The Plan reflects each church making local choices about the worship times. A unique situation, but one I pray God will bless.

When we are allowed to meet in fellowship fully – we plan to hold celebration services – to praise God and give thanks for His ceaseless love and grace. It will be a chance to invite the local community to give thanks for the selfless giving of all, especially the front-line workers, the NHS and those in community. It will be a time to remember and reflect – in worship to God.
